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Wyoming Hunger Initiative is the official initiative of First Lady Jennie Gordon and is governed by the Board of Directors of the Wyoming Governor's Residence Foundation, a registered 501(c)3 nonprofit organization.



#### **Letter from First Lady Jennie**

In 2023, we celebrated Wyoming Hunger Initiative's fourth anniversary while honoring the initial tenants that the initiative was based on: one, to never reinvent the wheel and two, to be in all twenty-three counties. Wyoming Hunger Initiative prides itself on being uniquely positioned to provide the framework and foundation for successful collaboration and solutions to hunger statewide.

Through the relationships that have been developed across the state specific to food insecurity, Wyoming Hunger Initiative has identified partners in every community. We were able to host our first Regional Summit in Natrona County earlier this year with a secondary event hosted in the northeastern region this fall, to bring folks together who are working in this space. The result? A whole lot of networking, sharing of resources, and collaborations that will lead these regions forward, together, while also producing realistic action items that are already underway.

Beef for Backpacks was launched as a pilot program in 2023 to utilize Wyoming resources to support the work of programs that make a real impact for children. 18,700 beef sticks were distributed during the pilot period in Laramie County. Wyoming Hunger Initiative's partnership with 307 Meat Company, Wyoming Stock Growers Association, and Wyoming Beef Council to provide high-quality, locally raised protein in a portable form is a Wyoming solution to hunger. Thanks to the success of the pilot program, Beef for Backpacks officially launched statewide for the 2023-2024 school year.

Approximately 86,000 Wyoming residents struggle with food insecurity. Nearly 28,000 of those are children. Wyoming Hunger Initiative stands ready to support the grassroots efforts of every Wyoming county. Together, we can do so much more. Take a look for yourself.

Quality product. Local solutions. That's the Wyoming way.


Food from the Farm + Ranch was created to solve a Wyoming challenge with a Wyoming solution; using Wyoming agricultural products to combat food insecurity. Fresh food and sources of high-quality protein are notoriously expensive and difficult to procure for the food bank system.

Whether it is local ranchers donating to the cause, or animals being purchased through livestock sales at local county fairs, everyone is stepping up to fight food insecurity in Wyoming.

Since Food from the Farm + Ranch was launched in 2020, 230+ animals have been donated.

This translates to 100,000+ lbs of fresh and local protein being distributed to anti-hunger organizations statewide.





1 beef yields 2,880 beef sticks.

**55 beef** are needed to serve the **5,485 kids** in the weekend food bag programs around the state.

This program utilizes Wyoming resources to support the work of weekend food programs, making a real impact for children.


After a successful pilot in Laramie County, *Beef for Backpacks* was expanded statewide to meet the needs of programs in almost every Wyoming county.











### FOOD FROM THE FARM + RANCH: FAIR TO FORK

Sources of high-quality protein are notoriously expensive and difficult to procure for local food pantries.

In partnership with University of Wyoming Extension 4-H, FFA, and the Hughes Charitable Foundation, *Fair to Fork* worked to purchase secondary hogs through a lottery selection, from almost every county in Wyoming. Wyoming Hunger Initiative will purchase the pig, ensure the meat is processed by a USDA or state-inspected participating facility, and then coordinate with the 4-H or FFA member to donate it to a local anti-hunger organization in the county of origin.









2023 Fair to Fork participants donated **22 hogs** to 23 anti-hunger organizations.

This partnership between University of Wyoming Extension, Cent\$ible Nutrition Program, and the Master Gardeners program was made possible this year in large part due to the generosity of Wyoming Downs.











**27,320 lbs** of produce was donated in 2023.

**29 grants** were distributed in 2023, totaling **\$27,060**.

# INFRASTRUCTURE GRANTS

Solving community problems requires all hands on deck—and funding.

Wyoming Hunger Initiative grants are intended to support infrastructure and longevity of anti-hunger organizations as well as long-term, sustainable solutions to food insecurity across the state.

For the third year, Wyoming Hunger Initiative sold "Hearts for Hunger" during the month of February for \$5 each, proving that no matter the size of the donation, every dollar makes a difference. All funds raised were put towards infrastructure grants

Grant funding also comes from the Wyoming Hunger Initiative *Hunger Champions Circle*, which is a team of dedicated ambassadors who serve as catalysts in the ongoing mission to end food insecurity in Wyoming.

Because of the generosity of the Hughes Charitable Foundation through a match, all applications that fit the grant criteria were funded this year.

Some of their 2023 accomplishments include:

- Added three new board members to the team to ensure geographic representation across the state. These additions include Katie Brown of Wheatland, Danielle McNiven of Pavillion, and Susie von Ahrens of Rock Springs.
- Launched *Beef for Backpacks*, a statewide snack stick distribution program for weekend food bag programs to ensure a high-quality, local protein for children.
- Carefully evaluated infrastructure grant applications, selected recipients, and distributed grant funds.
- Monitored the current strategic plan closely to ensure that milestones were met and that the scope of work continued to fight food insecurity in Wyoming.
- Worked with the Grow A Little Extra partners to recognize that the program was ready to have its own legs and thus it was rebranded to have its own logo outside of Food from the Farm + Ranch.
- Planned and executed two regional summits in Casper and Gillette to bring folks together who are working in this space.
